#### The Data Analysis Report:

#### Analysis by Category:

- 1. SC: The number of SC students varies across courses and years. In most cases, SC students are significantly represented, with a slight fluctuation in numbers across years.
- 2. ST: The representation of ST students is comparatively lower than SC students, and the numbers also fluctuate but remain relatively low.
- 3. NTB, NTC, VJNT: These categories show some representation, but the numbers are generally lower than those of the SC and ST categories.
- 4. OBC, SBC, EBC, EWS: Students from these categories are represented somewhat, but it's notably lower than the SC and ST categories.
- 5. Physically Handicapped: The representation of physically handicapped students is minimal across all categories.

SC students usually have the highest representation, followed by ST, NTB, NTC, and other categories.

#### **Overall Trends:**

- 2. Although present, the representation of other categories, such as NTB, NTC, VJNT, OBC, etc., is comparatively lower.
- 3. Continuous efforts are needed to ensure diversity and inclusivity across all categories, including enhancing representation from underrepresented groups like ST, NTB, NTC, VJNT, etc.
